1.0 INTRODUCTION

The Southern and Eastern Africa Chief Justices' Forum (SEACJF) serves as a formal platform and structured framework through which Chief Justices from Eastern and Southern Africa—and the broader continent—can collectively engage in dialogue on critical issues affecting justice delivery. It enables the development and adoption of coordinated action plans aimed at strengthening judicial systems in a systematic and sustained manner across the region. Since the Annual General Meeting held in October 2024, the Forum has continued to carry out its day-to-day activities. A summary of these activities is provided below.

2.0 SUMMARY OF ACTIVITIES SINCE THE 2024 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

2.1. Participation in 7TH Congress of the Constitutional Jurisdictions of Africa (CJCA) (November, 2024)

The Forum was invited to participate in the CJCA Congress hosted by the Republic of Zimbabwe. The Chairperson of the Forum, in his address, made the following observation:

"The shared membership of the CJCA and the Forum further underscores the necessity for collaboration between the two organizations. Conferences like these constitute a vital platform for exchange, reflection and co-operation, as well as the broader convergence at the World Conference on Constitutional Justice (WCCJ)."

The Congress brought together a total of 150 participants, including members from forty (40) African Constitutional and Supreme Courts and Councils that are part of the CJCA. Also present were the Supreme and Constitutional Courts of Iraq, Russia, and Turkey, attending in their capacity as Observer Members of the CJCA, as well as the Constitutional Court of Austria, which participated as a special guest.

Key attendees included representatives from the African Union, the African Court on Human and Peoples' Rights, the World Conference on Constitutional Justice, and the Council of Europe's Commission for Democracy through Law. The Congress also featured regional groups active in the field of constitutional justice, such as the Union of Arab Constitutional Courts, the Asian Association of Constitutional Courts and the Conference of European Constitutional Courts.

Additionally, civil society organizations like the International Association of Constitutional Law and the World Law Foundation contributed to the gathering. The central theme of the Congress was: "Human dignity as a value and founding principle: A source of constitutional interpretation, protection, and application of fundamental human rights."

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2.2. Facilitation of an Exchange Programme Between Angola and Namibia (November, 2024)

The Forum played a key role in facilitating a Judicial Exchange and Learning Initiative between the Republic of Angola and Namibia, aimed at enhancing Angola's judicial independence and efficiency. This exchange program, supported by the American Bar Association Rule of Law Initiative (ABA ROLI), allowed Angolan judges to learn from Namibia's successful case management system and judicial appointment processes. By participating in this exchange, it was hoped that Angola will also actively engage in future SEACJF events, reinforcing its commitment to regional judicial cooperation and strengthening its role within the Forum.









2.3. Participation in the 3rd Annual East African Court of Justice Judicial Conference, Kigali, Rwanda (February, 2025)

The two-day judicial conference, held at the Marriott Hotel in Kigali, focused on the theme "Justice, Ethics, and Enforcement of Decisions: A Judicial Pathway for Regional Development." The event brought together Chief Justices and judges from national and regional courts, cabinet ministers, attorneys general, heads of EAC organs and institutions, members of the East African Legislative Assembly, lawyers, academics, representatives from civil society organizations, the private sector, development partners, and other key stakeholders from the East African Community and across Africa.

In his keynote address at the Conference, the Chairperson noted that the Forum, recognizes the doctrine of separation of powers between the executive, the legislature as well as the Judiciary. He also observed that the principle of the independence of the Judiciary is enshrined in the national constitutions of most member countries of the Forum. He added that, notwithstanding the existence of the doctrine of separation of powers and the principle of the independence of the judiciary, the three arms of government do have specific areas of cooperation and collaboration particularly in areas involving public finances and the construction and maintenance of capital projects.










2.4. Management Committee Meeting (April, 2025)

The Management Committee of the Southern and Eastern Africa Chief Justices Forum (SEACJF) convened in Zanzibar on 28th April 2025. The meeting was attended by all members of the Committee namely; Hon. Chief Justice B. Maphalala, Kingdom of Eswatini (Chairperson), Hon. Chief Justice Peter S. Shivute of Namibia (Immediate Past Chairperson), Hon. Chief Justice Alfonse Owiny-Dollo of Uganda (Member) and Hon. Chief Justice Dr. Mumba Malila, SC of Zambia (Member).

Some of the key issues discussed during the meeting included the concerns regarding reports of threats and attacks on Judiciaries in the region. The Committee expressed serious concern over increasing reports of threats and attacks on judiciaries across the region. In response, the Committee established a subcommittee to develop recommendations on how SEACJF can support member judiciaries in safeguarding against such threats and preventing future occurrences.

The Committee also reviewed the latest report from the Southern and Eastern Africa Judicial Administrators Association (SEAJAA), noting progress made and areas requiring further improvement. The Committee guided that SEAJAA must ensure that all its activities adhere, strictly, to the provisions of their Constitution. They noted that most of the objectives mirror those of the Forum.

As part of its official programme, the Management Committee paid a courtesy call on the President of Zanzibar, His Excellency Dr. Hussein Ali Mwinyi. The members briefed the President on the objectives and work of SEACJF. In response, the President expressed his appreciation for the Forum, describing it as an excellent initiative that fosters the sharing of experiences and ideas among judiciaries in the region. He also welcomed the idea of the Forum's 2026 Annual Conference and General Meeting to be held in Zanzibar.













2.5. World Law Congress – Dominican Republic (4th May, 2025 to 6th May, 2025)

The Forum participated in the World Law Congress, held in Punta Cana, Dominican Republic, from May 4th – 6th, 2025. The event, convened by the World Law Foundation, brought together a diverse array of legal professionals, judicial leaders, scholars and organizations from around the world to engage on pressing global legal issues under the theme of promoting the rule of law as a cornerstone of peace and democracy.

Importance of SEACJF's Participation:

- Provided the Forum with an opportunity to contribute to global dialogue on the independence of the judiciary and the rule of law, core values at the heart of SEACJF's mission.
- Created a platform for networking and collaboration with other regional judicial networks and international legal organizations.
- Amplified the voice and experiences of Southern and Eastern African judiciaries in shaping global legal norms and reform agendas.
- Strengthened visibility and credibility of SEACJF as an active actor in global rule of law advocacy.









2.6. African Continent Commercial Court and ADR Summit – Kampala, Uganda (May, 2025)

SEACJF also participated in the Inaugural African Continent Commercial Court and ADR Summit, held in Kampala, Uganda, from July 25th – 27th, 2025. The summit, hosted at Speke Resort Munyonyo, brought together judicial leaders, including Chief Justices, Judges, and Judicial Officers from over 31 African countries, to discuss and advance the use of Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) mechanisms within the continent's commercial justice systems.

Why Participation Was Key:

- The Summit aligned with SEACJF's commitment to promoting judicial efficiency and enhancing access to justice, especially in the commercial sector.
- Enabled the Forum to learn from emerging best practices in ADR and Commercial Court innovation being adopted across Africa.
- Provided an opportunity to explore strategies for reducing case backlogs and promoting investor confidence through timely and fair commercial dispute resolution.
- Reinforced SEACJF's role in shaping regional discourse on judicial reform, innovation, and regional economic integration through sound dispute resolution frameworks.

3.1. AEJN Conference on Elections

SEACJF will actively participate in the Africa Electoral Justice Network (AEJN) Conference, which will bring together senior members of the judiciary, electoral commissions, legal scholars, and civil society actors to discuss electoral dispute resolution mechanisms and the evolving role of the judiciary in electoral processes across Africa.

Significance of Participation:

- Aligns with SEACJF's strategic focus on the judiciary's role in sustaining democratic governance and managing electoral disputes.
- Provides a platform for peer learning and sharing of jurisprudential developments and best practices in electoral adjudication.
- Reinforces SEACJF's commitment to judicial independence in politically sensitive matters such as elections.
- Enhances regional cooperation and knowledge exchange on strengthening legal

3.2. SEACJF Annual Conference and Annual General Meeting (AGM)

The Annual Conference and AGM is SEACJF's flagship event, providing a critical platform for judicial leaders from the region to deliberate on pressing legal and institutional issues affecting their jurisdictions. This year's gathering will be hosted by the Judiciary of Botswana.

Key Objectives:

- Review the state of judicial independence and accountability within member jurisdictions.
- Facilitate cross-jurisdictional exchange on legal reforms, case management innovation, and judicial capacity building.
- Conduct the Forum's statutory Annual General Meeting, including adoption of policy resolutions and institutional reports.
- Strengthen partnerships with regional and international judicial bodies and development partners.
